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INTRODUCING THE RRSA

UNICEF

- Unicef is the world's leading organisation for children and their rights,
- Unicef recognised children need a special convention just for them because people under 18 years old need special care and protection.
- UN Convention on the Rights of the Child -a universally agreed set of non-negotiable standards and obligations, built on varied legal systems and cultural traditions.
- These basic standards also called human rights set minimum entitlements and freedoms that should be respected and put into effect by governments.
- They apply to every human being everywhere.



THE CONVENTION

- The Convention has 54 articles in total. The general principles of the Convention are found in articles 2, 3, 6 and 12:
- i) non-discrimination ii) best interests of the child iii) life, survival and development iv) participation
- Articles 43–54 are about how adults and governments work together to make sure that all children get all their rights.
- The UK ratified the CRC on 16 December 1991. That means our government has to make sure that every child in the UK has all the rights in the Convention.
- Under the terms of the Convention, children are the 'rights holders' and adults are the 'duty bearers'.
- There are no conditions attached to them. They cannot be taken away. They are not linked to responsibilities.

- Mutual respect for rights informs all practice and relationships in school
- External validation recognises that we have embedded children's rights into our school's practice and ethos
